Attached are the evaluation/guideline forms for the 2008-2009 Kern County Oral Language Festival. Oral Language Festival is an opportunity for students to focus on interpretations of literary works.

Please review the guidelines and score sheets carefully and discuss the material with staff prior to festival preparation. Your regional contact will be responsible for having the site administrator sign off entries for the Kern County competition this year. Your signature will ensure that you have reviewed your entry (ies) for compliance. In signing for compliance, we ask that you verify that the piece and its presentation meet all the rules.

Literature selections must be appropriate for age, event, and presentation to a community audience. **Please do not allow pieces with obscene language.** Literature selections must be **published works** (not anonymous or author unknown) that are available to all students; selections that are found only in distributions such as organizational newsletters, the Internet, and regional newspapers are not acceptable because they are not available to all grade 4-8 students. **Students are allowed to use sound effects as written in the text, but may not add sound effects that alter the author's text.**

Appropriateness of both literature and mode of delivery is the responsibility of the site administrator. The administrator should be aware of and approve of all selections/presentations.

The 2008-2009 Kern County Oral Language Festival's five events are:

INTERPRETATION SERIOUS – SOLO and INTERPRETATION HUMOROUS - SOLO
INTERPRETATION SERIOUS – DUO and INTERPRETATION HUMOROUR – DUO
VERSE CHOIR

Timing for *all* events: Minimum time – 3 minutes Maximum time – 5 minutes

A solo interpretation is one student reciting a literary selection. This presentation should be an interpretation of a literary work*, not an imitation of an actor's performance. The literature must be a published work available to all students; selections that are found only in distributions such as organizational newsletters, the Internet, and regional newspapers are not acceptable because they are not available to all grade 4-8 students. The selection must be written by a known author. "Anonymous" or "author unknown" pieces are not acceptable.

GUIDELINES

- The student should select literature which can be presented as an oral interpretation.
- The literature should be appropriate for age, event, and presentation to a community audience.
- Text may be deleted from the original work to meet time requirements, however, text may not be added to or altered in any other way. Sound effects are allowed as written in the text, but may not be added.
- Appropriateness of both literature and mode of delivery is the responsibility of the site principal.
- The student should be so thoroughly familiar with the literature that the audience feels the author's intentions, thoughts, and attitudes coming to them directly through the student.
- If more than one selection is used, there must be an obvious relationship and the selections must be tied carefully together. Short transitions may be added as necessary.
- The student should use voice, pauses, and rate of speaking as means of interpreting the selection. Using skill to gain and to keep audience attention, the student should be persuasive in communicating the literature.
- The student may use appropriate and natural gestures to suggest the essence of the characters as the author saw them; the student may move around.

VERSE CHOIR

A verse choir is a group of **at least three and not more than eight students** reciting a literary selection in unison using whole group and small group parts. This presentation should be an interpretation of a literary work*, not an imitation of an actor's performance. The literature must be a published work available to all students; selections that are found only in distributions such as organizational newsletters, the Internet, and regional newspapers are not acceptable because they are not available to all grade 4-8 students. The selection must be written by a known author. "Anonymous" and "author unknown" pieces are not acceptable.

GUIDELINES

- The students should select literature which can be presented chorally.
- The literature should be appropriate for age, event, and student presentation to a community audience.
- Text may be deleted from the original work to meet time requirements, however, text may not be added to or altered in any other way. Sound effects are allowed as written in the text but may not be added.
- Appropriateness of both literature and mode of delivery is the responsibility of the site principal.
- If more than one selection is used, there must be an obvious relationship and the parts must be tied together carefully. Short transitions may be added as necessary.
- Develop appropriate and interesting dialogues, parts, tonal qualities, and rhythmic qualities.
- Use a variety of small and large group parts.
- Blend voices, pause together, and put emphasis on the same words.
- Speak with appropriate expression, tempo, and volume; avoid "yelling" at the audience.
- There should be no solo or dominating voices.
- Reflect the author's viewpoint and mood.
- Use facial expressions and gestures that reflect the author's emotions and intentions.
- The event is an oral presentation. Only appropriate gestures should be used; no moving feet.
